Projects:

Please choose one of the following options to complete over the first half of the Autumn Term. This will be due in Friday 25th October 2024.

- 1. Science: This term we are learning about forces. Create your own pulley system to lift a small weight.
- 2. History: We are learning about the Tudors. Research one of Henry the VIII's wives and create a non-chronological report on them including how they met Henry, how long their marriage was and how it ended.
- 3. History/Art: Research different type of portrait that the Tudors used and draw your own self-portrait in the Tudor style.
- 4. ICT: Create a poster with a list of 5 rules of how to stay safe online with pictures and symbols to help emphasis the message.
- 5. Geography: Create a map of your local area including significant places of interest and amenities. If you wish to choose an area which is not specifically where you live that is equally fine.
- 6. Create a timeline of Tudor monarchs with the time which they reigned and three fun facts about each one.
